From vibrant opening ceremony displays to the closing celebration, the continent showcased its rich culture and diversity. Our athletes delivered outstanding performances. Kenya's **Faith Kipyegon**, Botswana's **Letsile Tebogo**, Algeria's **Imane Khelif**, Morocco's **Soufiane El Bakkali**, Nigeria's **D'Tigress**, and South Sudan's **Bright Stars** were just a few of the continent's shining stars.

We are particularly proud of the outstanding achievements of African women athletes, including Algeria's Imane Khelif, Kenya's Beatrice Chebet, Uganda's Peruth Chemutai, South Africa's Tatjana Smith, and Algeria's Kaylia Nemour. And we know their accomplishments will inspire generations. This year's Olympics were the first to achieve gender parity and we applaud the International Olympic Committee for its commitment to gender equality as well as providing a nursery for competing athletes with children. These are crucial steps toward a more equitable sporting world.

However, despite the continent's brilliant athletes, challenges persist. Of the 54 nations that participated, only 12 secured medals for Africa. It's clear that we have yet to fully harness the continent's athletic potential. The success of African athletes competing under the flags of nations outside the continent underscores the need for a robust local sporting ecosystem and highlights untold stories of both triumph and struggle that must be addressed to unlock Africa's full athletic potential.

At ASP, we are dedicated to working with stakeholders across the continent and diaspora to address these challenges. Our recent Africa Soft Power Summit brought together industry leaders to discuss strategies for powering Africa's sports economy through innovation and inclusion.
